

MISS ROCKEFELLER WEDDED TO MR. DODGE

Ceremony at William Rockefeller's Home, with Only Near Relatives Present.

THE REV. DR. CARY MARRIED

Society Flocks to Mr. Kinnicutt's Marriage to Miss Tuckerman—Today's Social Doings.

Marcellus Hartley Dodge, son of the late Norman Dodge, and grandson of Marcellus Hartley, was married to Miss Ethel Geraldine Rockefeller at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon at the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Rockefeller, 689 Fifth Avenue. The Rev. Dr. Ernest M. Stires, rector of St. Thomas's Church, officiated.

The house was decorated with bridesmaids' roses and palms. The bride wore a princess robe of white satin, with tulle and lace, and a tulle veil, and carried white roses. She wore no jewels. She was given in marriage by her father. Her only attendant, Miss Anna Bush of Tarrytown, wore white chiffon and carried lilies of the valley. Barent Lefferts was Mr. Dodge's best man.

Mr. Dodge's engagement to Miss Rockefeller was announced in THE TIMES on March 19. He has made his home with his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Hartley. Marcellus Hartley, his grandfather, was the famous merchant and financier, who died in 1898. Mr. Dodge inherited a share of his large estate. After Mr. Dodge had been graduated, in 1903, from Columbia, he and his aunt, Mrs. George W. Jenkins, gave Hartley Hall, one of its largest dormitories, to the university.

Mr. Dodge has succeeded to many of his grandfather's offices. He is President of the Remington Arms Company, Vice President of the Union Metallic Cartridge Company, President of the Bridgeport Gun Implement Company, a director in the Equitable Trust Company, the International Banking Company, and the M. Hartley Company. He is a member of the Lawyers', Essex County, and the Country and City clubs. At Columbia he was president of his class, president of the Y. M. C. A., coxswain of his class crew, and manager of the track team.

THE REV. JOSEPH CARY WEDS.

His Marriage to Mrs. Wendell a Surprise to Their Friends.

The Rev. Joseph Cary, Archdeacon of Troy and for thirty-three years rector of the Bethesda Episcopal Church at Saratoga, was married to Mrs. Menzo Edgar Wendell of Troy and Saratoga at the Church of the Heavenly Rest on Wednesday at noon. The Rev. D. Parker Morgan, rector of the church, officiated. The bride was given in marriage by John H. Peck, and the only witnesses of the service were two of Dr. Cary's children.

The wedding was not announced in advance, even to the most intimate friends of Dr. and Mrs. Cary. They will sail for Europe on the Cedric to-day for a tour of the Continent and England that will last until the latter part of June, and then they will return to Saratoga.

Dr. Cary is 65 years old and his bride is twenty years his junior. Mr. Wendell died five years ago, leaving a large fortune to his widow.
