### COUNTY NEWS

#### FROM OUR EXCHANGES

#### Chehalis.

(See Neeget.)

Helen, the five-year-old daughter of Dr. and Mrs. John T. Coleman, Tuesday afternoon at half past three, of malignant diphtheria. Helen had been sick with a sore throat since the preceding Wednesday and had been in company of the little daughters of Dr. and Mrs. C. D. Powell until two hours before her untimely death. She attended the Academy of the Holy Rosary in this city, and in spite of her tender years was considered very bright by her instructors. The loss of a dear playmate is felt by a number of the little ones of Chehalis, while the entire city sympathizes with Doctor and Mrs. Coleman in their deep loss.

O. M. Sage, who will be remembered by many old timers in Lewis county, is wanted in Los Angeles for theft. According to an issue of the Los Angeles Times of January 28, Sage has been chief deputy coroner under Coroner Roy S. Lanterman of that city, and the two of them are accused of robbing dead men, and falsifying their accounts. The depredations were alleged to reach into thousands of dollars and included not only coin but jewelry. Sage made part restitution, but when officers sought to arrest him on the 20th he could not be found. Mr. Sage formerly conducted a confectionery business in Chehalis. Later he went to Mineral and was in business there with a man named Jones. He again returned to Chehalis, then went to Los Angeles. While here Sage tried to break into the political game and sought the republican nomination for county clerk.

A few figures gleaned from the county treasurer's office this week are interesting in that they show the strength of the Weyerhaeuser Timber Company in Lewis county. For this year their taxes amount to \$81,722.80, on their holdings in this county after the rebates are counted out. The tax rebates amount to over \$2500. It is estimated roughly that they own nearly six billion feet of timber in Lewis county, and about one-third of the timber acreage. Up to the time the board sat as a board of equalization, the cost of the timber cruise was about \$28,750. The increase on the taxes of the Weyerhaeuser holdings to the time of equalization, which included that portion which was equalized by the board, was about \$20,500. As will be readily seen, the increase of the taxes more than covered the cost of the cruise of the entire county to that date. Moreover, fully two-thirds of the Weyerhaeuser timber holdings is yet to be equalized. Cruiser Clinton has estimated that the total cost of the county cruise will be slightly over \$40,000 or 6 cents per acre and taking the figures above given as a basis, it will be seen that the increase in taxes coming to the county from the Weyerhaeuser holdings will go a long way toward paying for the total cruise of the county timber for the first year. The next largest timber interest in the county is the Millwaukee Land Company, an auxiliary of the Millwaukee railroad, and to which the Continental Timber Company recently decided their holdings. This company's taxes are over \$32,000. All county cruisers will be called in tomorrow night and the work discontinued until spring or summer. The cruise is about completed, only about 6) sections remaining in the mountains, where the snow makes work very difficult, and which will be finished when the weather becomes better.
