WEST FINDS TIME
TO GET TO COURT

HE IS FINALLY ARRAIGNED ON A CHARGE OF ASSAULT.

THE BRADY CASE GOES OVER

Woman whom he is alleged to have attempted to poison protests against being detained as a witness, but changes her mind.

Judson West, who is charged with shooting another man, finally found time to come into court for arraignment, and Judge Donlan granted him until next Saturday to plead. The shooting was done six months or more ago and West has been cited to appear for arraignment half a dozen times, but Peter Breen, his attorney, always explained that West was too busy to attend court and the arraignment was each time postponed.

The case of the state against Thomas Brady, a charge of assault in the first degree, was postponed until Monday for trial, but it is not certain that the case will be a settled one. Sadie Cohen, the complaining witness, told Deputy County Attorney Baldwin that if the case did not come to trial yesterday she would leave the city, and Mr. Baldwin reported the matter to the court. The young woman happened to be in the courtroom and the judge talked to her. Her home is in Ogden and she had been in Butte only two months when she met Brady and he attempted to poison her, according to the accusation. She told the court that she came from Ogden to attend the trial 31 days ago and could not afford to wait so long, as she was among strangers, but Judge Donlan told her that if he thought she would not show up Monday he would turn her over to the sheriff. With that threat, the young woman vastly replied that she would be on hand. It is charged that Brady was drinking with the young woman in one of the best light districts of the city and that he put poison in a glass of beer which he offered to her, but she, after tasting the stuff, rejected it. The beer was afterward analyzed and found to contain some poison.

Edwyn McElierman was arraigned on a charge of assault in the first degree for cutting and stabbing Miss McKiernan, and he entered a plea of not guilty. The accused made an unsuccessful attempt to escape from an arrest seven days ago. His victim is still in a hospital.

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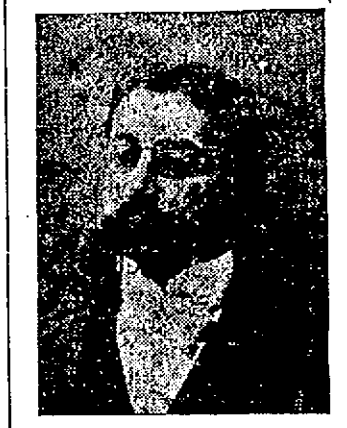
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
