AROUND THE STATE

Items of Interest by Standard Correspondents

EIGHT SURVEYING PARTIES WORKING FOR GOVERNMENT

Helena, May 24.—Eight parties are now in the field at work on 1,900,000 acres of land the government proposes to survey in Montana this year. It is the intention, says J. Scott Harrison, assistant supervisor of surveys, to put at least two more public land survey crews in the field and from two to four special parties in the forest reserve, providing engineers can be found who are competent to take charge of them. The register of the civil service has been exhausted and now, unless special authority is obtained to employ more engineers, it will be impossible to put more crews in the field. About 200 engineers took examination, but only 19 qualified. Some who failed are said to be competent to do the work, but they fell down when it came to theory. Plans have been made to survey approximately 1,038,560 acres of public land and 875,520 acres of Northern Pacific lands. The railroad has made deposits to defray the cost of the work. Most of the work will be carried on in the western part of the state, where lands listed for the last three years for survey were temporarily passed in favor of lands in Eastern Montana. The Eastern Montana appropriation has been exhausted and now that part of the state will be on the same basis as the western part. In 1912, 2,400,000 acres were surveyed in Montana.

LIVINGSTON NEWS.

Livingston, May 24.—Eva Barton has begun suit in the district court for a divorce from Charles W. Barton, alleging failure to provide and Intemperance. The couple were married in this city Jan. 4, 1901. They have one child, adopted, aged 7. Reports from the upper Yellowstone and Shields valleys declare that the spring crops are practically all in and that ranchers are now getting ready to put in their potatoes. All the county has enjoyed more rain than ever before during the spring and present indications are that there will be a good crop. That the railroad is expecting there will be a large acreage and yield this year is indicated by the fact that they are getting a larger number of engines and boxcars ready for the fall business than in years past. The shops are running on full time and with full force. The jury in the case of Charles Bruckert against A. W. Chadbourne, in which the plaintiff sought \$500 for damages to his fax crop by cattle trespassing, brought in a verdict at 8 o'clock tonight for \$20 damages.

At the Railway clubrooms Tuesday night there will be an address by George T. Conley, fuel supervisor for the Northern Pacific, from St. Paul. He will talk on the question of fuel economy and an engine on the Montana division will give a talk on the same question from the standpoint of the engineer. Simon Plesin of Jardine was killed three hours during the past week. Two were of the black variety and one was brown. Two were trapped, but the third was killed after a fierce encounter when he looked back of him as he heard a noise and saw the bear coming for him. He shot, but only wounded him by breaking his back and who, angered by the shot, made a desperate charge for the man. Another bullet behind the ear as the bear was within 10 feet of Plesin finished him. This made the eleventh bear the man has killed. Bear meat has been the chief article of diet about Jardine since Plesin got busy.

THREE MORE TOWNSITE SALES HELD AT LIVINGSTON

These are the last townsite sales the company will hold here, making 15 in all.

The tour book contains plates covering three-fourths of the area of the entire state and shows 2,500 miles of county roads. Many of the maps show section lines one mile apart in fine dotted lines, providing a quick and ready means of calculating short distances, as well as locating landmarks, making the guide of great value to land agents, real estate men and others. Lakes, streams and other points of interest are also shown. The opening pages of the book contain strip maps and logs of West-gard's "Northwest Trail," beginning where the trail enters the valley of the Yellowstone river, near Beach, N. D., following that stream via Miles City to Billings, Livingston and Bozeman, through the Gallatin valley and on through Pipestone pass to Butte; thence on to Anaconda, Deer Lodge, Missoula, Ravalli and Thompson Falls to the Montana-Washington state line. There are five maps of Montana's famous playgrounds, Yellowstone and Glacier National parks. The book contains nearly 70 maps, is printed on heavy, russet-colored, bond paper, and sells at \$1.50 per copy. USES OF GROUND MICA.

From the Indianapolis News. Large quantities of scrap mica—small sheets and the waste from the manufacture of sheet mica—are ground for different uses, among which are the decoration of wall paper and the manufacture of lubricants, fancy insulations, according to government geologists. Ground mica applied to wall paper gives a silvery luster. When mixed with grease or oil, finely ground mica forms an excellent lubricant for axles and other bearings. Mixed with mica is used as insulators for trolley wires. Ground mica for electrical insulation must be free from metallic minerals.

MINERS' HOLIDAYS.

From the New York Sun. "Holidays are the most aggravating of all obstacles to the continuous operation of an anthracite coal mine," said Capt. W. A. May, general manager of the mines of the Pennsylvania Coal company, in and about Dunmore, Pa., a suburb of Scranton. "We have all 67 varieties and then some out here. Strikes, floods and cave-ins, things the public hears of in connection with suspension of work in the mines, are matters we are thoroughly well prepared to cope with. But we never can tell when a miners' holiday is coming, nor how many men it will affect until it is time for a new shift to go to work." The Pennsylvania Coal company has miners of 23 nationalities on its pay rolls. Each of these has holidays peculiarly its own. There are 12 legal holidays in Pennsylvania, two of them election days, in February and November, and every Saturday afternoon is a legal holiday. Besides these Polish Catholics have nine holidays, Greek Catholics 10, French and French Canadians from three to five, Jews of various nationalities from six to eight, Lithuanians
