

**Elisha Smith Thomas.**

Elisha Smith Thomas, Protestant Episcopal Bishop of Kansas, died last Saturday night at his home in Salina. He was born in Wickham, Mass., March 2, 1834; was graduated from Yale in 1858, and from the Divinity School, Middletown, Conn., in 1858; was ordained Deacon in 1861, and became a priest soon afterward. He took charge of St. Paul's Church, New-Haven, in 1861, and remained in that place three years. He was elected rector of Seabury Hall, Faribault, Minn., in 1864, and Professor of Old and New Testament Exegesis there. He became rector of St. Mark's Church, St. Paul, in 1869, and of St. Paul's, in the same city, in 1876. He was consecrated Bishop of Kansas in May, 1884.

**Dr. Robert Ogden Du Bois.**

Dr. Robert Ogden Du Bois, house physician at the Nursery and Child's Hospital, 571 Lexington Avenue, died Saturday at his home, 113 East Nineteenth Street, from heart disease. Dr. Du Bois was educated at the Sheffield Scientific School and the Yale Medical School.

He began the practice of medicine in New-York in 1884. He was a son of Dr. Henry Du Bois of New-Haven, Conn., and great grandson of Chief Justice John Jay. Dr. Du Bois was thirty-five years old. He leaves a wife and three children.

**OBITUARY NOTES.**

—Albert Von Haller Carpenter, for many years the General Passenger Agent of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railroad, died Saturday night at his home in Milwaukee, aged seventy-three years. He was born in Middlesex, Vt., and did his first work as a railroad man for the Vermont Central Railroad. Later he was employed by the Michigan Southern and Northern Indiana Railroad. He entered the employ of the Milwaukee and Chicago Railroad in 1856, became the General Ticket Agent of the road in 1862, and in 1866 became the General Ticket and Passenger Agent for the Milwaukee and St. Paul Railroad, and held the same office in the management of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railroad up to 1890.

—Dr. Arnold Hallett of Norwich, Conn., died yesterday, aged sixty-nine years. He was a physician in Brooklyn for thirty years, being connected with the Long Island Hospital. He was born in St. John, N. B., and was graduated from the College of Physicians and Surgeons, New-York. He leaves a wife. The interment will be in Brooklyn.

—Thomas Day, head of the firm of Thomas McMullen & Co. of New-York, died of apoplexy yesterday at his home, in South Orange, aged forty-eight years. He leaves a wife and one daughter.
